Executive Summary

Accomplishments of Friends of CRLS during Fiscal Year 2017-18 (July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018)

We raised \$205,350 to support opportunities for CRLS students, grads, and faculty.

This sum pushed our grand total to date past the million dollar mark!

- \$203,809 in monetary donations, bringing our monetary donation grand total (FY06/07-FY17/18) to \$1,097,508
- \$16,000 in additional in-kind donations, including Spring Bash auction items and Spring Raffle prizes '18
- **The Friends of CRLS Spring 2018 Bash raised \$80,200.** Google in Kendall Square hosted and catered the event on March 29, 2018, which was made possible by 27 sponsors and approximately 60 volunteers, ranging from CRLS students to Massachusetts State Rep. Marjorie Decker. By far our most successful fundraiser to date, the Spring 2018 Bash brought in 33% more than last year's Bash proceeds of \$60,303 — including \$10,000 in support from Google each year — with the \$19,897 increase due largely to the additions of live and online auctions.
- **College Scholarships presented by FOCRLS totaled \$50,500.** We presented \$49,500 to 33 members of the CRLS Class of 2018 — an increase of 32% over the \$37,500 we presented to the Class of 2017 — and remitted two \$500 installments for the "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarships to our '17 and '16 recipients. Additionally, FOCRLS organized and hosted the third annual CRLS Scholarship Night Reception for Scholarship Sponsors, which took place on May 17, 2018, to recognize sponsors' contributions and give them the opportunity to meet awardees and their families.
- **Faculty Innovation Grants totalled \$12,460.** We awarded grants to 20 teachers and staff members to fund 14 individual and collaborative proposals of up to \$1,000 each to enrich curriculum in subjects including computer science and biology, enhance extracurricular activities including Falcon Friends and the Bike Advocacy Club, and help build community through activities and programs. The total is a 52% increase over what we awarded last year.
- **Student Travel Fellowships totalled \$24,074.** We awarded fellowships to 11 financially and academically qualified students for educational and service learning trips: nine for the February trip to Ecuador & the Galapagos Islands and two for the April trip to England, Ireland, & Wales. Our total in Fellowships awarded this year was triple our total last year.
- **Unsung Heroes Awards**, funded by FOCRLS and administered by the CRLS Deans of Students, were presented to 16 emerging student achievers each term for their efforts in citizenship, leadership, gains in attendance, academic improvement, and contributions to a positive school climate. The number of awardees now totals 576.
- **Faculty Distinction Awards** were presented, for the eleventh year, on the graduation stage in June to four teachers nominated by seniors for their positive influence on students' experience at CRLS, bringing the total to 44 teachers and staff members.

Programs

College Scholarships

FOCRLS awarded \$50,500 in College Scholarships this fiscal year. We presented a record sum of \$49,500 in the form of 37 College Scholarships to 33 members of the Class of 2018. Additionally, we awarded two installments to our '17 and '16 "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarship recipients. Our '18 total is 32% over our '17 total of \$37,500, with the \$12,000 increase made possible largely by new sponsors.

Among our new College Scholarship sponsors is CambridgeSeven, a Cambridge-based global architecture and design firm celebrating its 55-year anniversary by committing to annual STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) scholarships through FOCRLS for 11 years. The first recipient of the CambridgeSeven STEAM Award is Soliana Yebio, a first generation college student who excelled in both academics and community service while at CRLS and is now enrolled at UMass Lowell to study biomedical engineering.

"For my undergraduate study, I want to major in biomedical engineering, and for my graduate degree, I want to attend a medical school. I want to invent a device or medicine that can save many people. I also envision myself as a doctor working with people who are dealing with a different kind of illness such as cancer, diabetes, or strokes to help them adjust to their lives. Not only do I want to help the people within my community, but I also want to travel to different parts of the world and save as many lives as I can. My main agenda is to provide easy access to healthcare."

CRLS Scholarship Night for the Class of 2018 was Thursday, May 17, and FOCRLS organized and hosted one of the evening's events, the third annual CRLS Scholarship Night Reception for Scholarship Sponsors to recognize their contributions and give them the opportunity to meet awardees and their families. Approximately 150 people (triple the number of attendees last year) mingled at the reception, which took place at CRLS on Kimbrough Way and in the College and Career Resource Center. Special guest speaker Kester Messan-Hilla, to whom FOCRLS presented three scholarships in 2017 and who now attends Williams College, shared his experiences and aspirations with an attentive audience. The Rindge School of Technical Arts (RSTA) Culinary Arts Department catered the reception with an array of sandwiches, baked goods, and lemonade. Funding from CRLS and support from CRLS's Fiscal Manager Julia Guida made the reception possible. The Scholarship Night ceremony in the Fitzgerald Theater was followed by a collation in theater lobby.

Faculty Innovation Grants

FOCRLS awarded a record sum in Faculty Innovation Grants this year of \$12,460, which was allocated to 20 teachers and staff members, with each grant of up to \$1,000 for 14 individual and collaborative projects, experiences, and services.

This year's Faculty Innovation Grants total was a 52% increase of \$4,240 over last year, when we presented nine grants amounting to \$8,220.

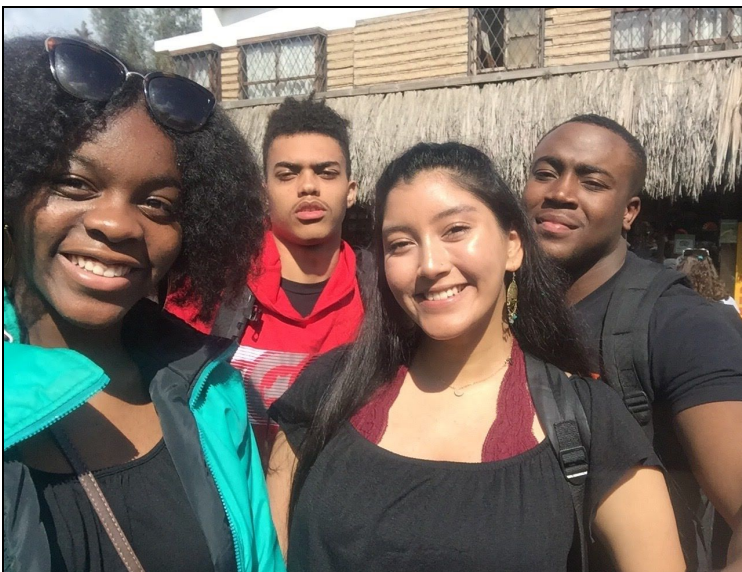
“Students were introduced to a unique experience, exploring nature and learning in a new environment. This trip built positive culture and taught students important skills. Students were developing outdoor skills such as map reading and navigating trails as well as improving teamwork and leadership skills.”

Student Travel Fellowships

FOCRLS presented a record sum in Student Travel Fellowships this year of \$24,074. This total is triple last year, when we distributed \$7,541 among three travel fellows. This abundance was in large part due to donors who made gifts totaling \$6,753.55 specifically for Student Travel Fellowships as well as a donation of \$693.23 from Bertucci’s Italian Restaurant, all raised by the Ecuador & Galapagos Islands travel group.

We awarded fellowships to 11 financially and academically qualified students for 2018 educational and service learning trips: eight for the February trip to Ecuador & the Galapagos Islands and two for the April trip to England, Ireland & Wales. Fellowships cover up to 75% of trip costs, with each of the fellows fundraising and earning 25% or more of the money they need to participate in school-authorized group trips.

“Being in Yunguilla, Ecuador was truly the best experience. Whether it was the scenery, food or spending time with locals, I enjoyed and cherished every single moment. There was one day in particular that I will always remember. We had spent the first half of the day working in small factories with others and I appreciated gaining an insight on what a work day is like for most. After a long day, we split up into two teams, Cambridge and the locals, and played a two or three hour soccer game; that was definitely the most fun I’d had in a while. After Cambridge’s victory, we were divided into smaller groups and ate a home-cooked dinner at different people’s homes in the village. It was amazingly kind that they invited us over and fed us such delicious meals. My time in Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands was positively an adventure like no other, but I value my experience in Yunguilla the most.”

Unsung Heroes Awards

FOCRLS sponsors the Unsung Heroes Awards, which celebrates 16 students each term, one per grade per learning community, for an annual total of 64 honorees. This year brought our all-time total since 2009 to 576 students chosen by deans, counselors, and teachers for their particular emerging leadership qualities, such as support of peers, contribution to a positive school environment, stewardship, community service, academic improvement, and other achievements that might otherwise go unrecognized. The Heroes and their families attend breakfast celebrations catered by the Rindge School of Technical Arts culinary department where the honorees are presented with certificates and Falcon logo watches.

The 2018 Faculty Distinction Awardees

Kevin Dua, who joined the CRLS faculty in 2017, is the first African-American to receive the Massachusetts History Teacher of the Year Award (in 2017). As a teacher of psychology and history and faculty adviser to the Black Student Union, he helps students to better their identities. He holds a B.A. from the College of William & Mary and an M.Ed. from Boston College.

Rachel Otty has taught at CRLS since 2005 and currently teaches 9th grade World History and Modern World History. She is passionate about teaching her students to challenge assumptions. She has a Bachelor's Degree in history from Mount Holyoke College and a Master's Degree through the Boston Teacher Residency program.

Brett Cramp is a drama teacher and director with the CRLS Visual & Performing Arts department. He creates a safe and nurturing environment that allows students to exceed their expectations of themselves. He holds degrees from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music and Emerson College.

Tobe Korsgren Stromberg grew up in Cambridge and attended the Pilot School at CRLS. In her 20 years as a teacher at CRLS, she has taught biology, genetics, AP Environmental Science and a next generation farming class. She serves as the faculty advisor for the Environmental Action Club. Tobe strives to treat each student as a multifaceted person. She studied Human Ecology at Connecticut College and Forestry & Environmental Studies at Yale University.

Donations and Gifts

We at FOCRLS are deeply grateful to all of our generous donors for their contributions.

Summary of Giving

In FY2017-18, FOCRLS received **\$203,809** in donations from hundreds of generous people in and around Cambridge who want to brighten the future for our students and our whole community: **\$116,226** came from individual donors, including families; **\$83,216** came from organizations, including businesses, corporations, and foundations; **\$4,367** came from Spring Raffle ticket sales.

Additionally, FOCRLS received an estimated total of \$16,000 in-kind donations of goods and services over the course of the fiscal year, including catering, venue, auction items, presentations, and performances for our Spring Bash, as well as gift cards for prizes in our Spring Raffle.

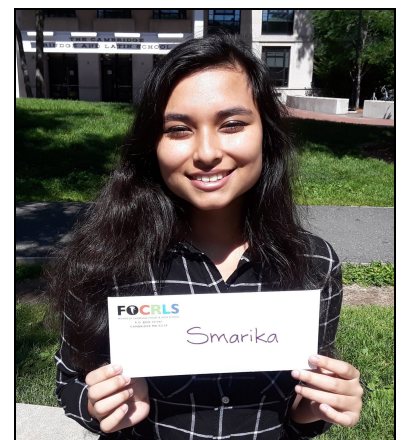

Fundraising Events & Projects

Spring Bash 2018

For the second consecutive year, Google graciously hosted and catered our Spring Bash, and again, the Bash was a smash! On Thursday, March 29, nearly 250 guests, event sponsors, presenters, student performers, and volunteers were enjoying the evening at the Kendall Square venue, *Celebrating Our Students, Investing in Our Future*.

The event brought in \$80,200 — significantly more than any other FOCRLS event or fundraising effort to date. This total is 33% over last year's Bash sum of \$60,303, and each year's total includes \$10,000 in support from Google. The \$19,897 increase over last year was due largely to the additions of a live auction at the event and an online auction in during the last three weeks in March through the night of the event, made possible by the enthusiasm of item donors, bidders, and auctioneer/emcee Robin Young.

Radio personality Robin Young was host and auctioneer. In addition to putting her trademark sparkle and even some sass into goading generous folks to up their bids, she moved the crowd by explaining her affinity for the school. A Cambridge resident since 1980, she said, her two great nephews – boys of color – were profoundly positively affected by the school. Zolan, now a Wall Street Journal reporter, she said, “wanted to do everything,” and CRLS was perfect for him; her other nephew was the opposite, and the school was perfect for him also, giving him the support he needed.

State Representative and CRLS alumna Marjorie Decker was the featured guest speaker, inspiring guests with her own story of how she was able to achieve success against the odds, thanks in part to the skills and qualities that CRLS programs and faculty helped her develop during her high school years. As at last year's Bash, Rep. Decker offered to lead State House tours to guests responding with donations to FOCRLS of \$250 each and attracted 13 visitors to Beacon Hill.
