

2010-11: EXPANDING OPPORTUNITY FOR CRLS STUDENTS AND FACULTY

Dear Friend of CRLS,

I am delighted to report that during the 2010-11 school year Friends of CRLS expanded opportunities at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School in ways both planned and unexpected, especially notable in light of losses in the economies of our nation and the world. We owe this expansion to the vision and generosity of the Cambridge community.

Our funding pool for the **Student Travel Fellowships**, a program we piloted in 2009-10, doubled from \$5,000 to \$10,000. This meant that we were able to support *seven students*, **five of them fully funded up to \$2500**, to participate in CRLS trips to London (2 students) the Dominican Republic (3 students), and Spain (2 students).

2010-11 also marked the first time that Friends of CRLS was able to solicit **faculty grant proposals** *twice* **during the academic year.** This doubling of the grant cycle, in fall '10 and again in spring '11, resulted in the funding of *eighteen faculty innovation grants*, in amounts of up to \$1000.

Another of our flagship programs, the **Unsung Heroes**, continued to name, recognize, and surprise students every term for progress that often goes unrecognized, unsung, and "under the radar." Now in its fourth year, the Unsung Heroes program has recognized approximately **eighty** students in grades 9 through 12.

For the first time in 2011, **FOCRLS offered scholarships of \$1000 each** to academically talented, low-income seniors who are the first in their family to go to a 4-year college or university. Our **two "First Scholars"** are community-minded students who each are heading toward careers in medicine and health, one at the University of Massachusetts/Boston, the other at Boston University.

At the June graduation ceremonies, class of 2011 students presented awards to four teachers nominated for their impact on the students' growth and learning. This year marks the **fifth year** that the coveted, FOCRLS-supported **Faculty Distinction Awards** were presented on stage, an opportunity for all in attendance to hear about the accomplishments of some of CRLS's best and most beloved teachers.

In spring 2011 FOCRLS was approached by the Student Engagement team, a group of seniors whose goal was to create a **first-time "Class Day" event for all 400 graduates**, complete with music, barbeque, signing of yearbooks, and lots of social time, on the Broadway tennis courts and park. In recognition of its value FOCRLS decided to fully fund this as a pilot year and even provided volunteers for this special event!

FOCRLS' base of support expanded this year as well with the **launching of our alumni outreach program.** Our first-ever alumni event took place in March, hosted by CRLS alum Kari Kuelzer at Grendel's Den, and we began our alumni outreach by mail and email.

As the school year ended, we were in for our biggest surprise. An anonymous donor contributed \$4,000 to start a scholarship fund in honor of our retiring principal, Dr. Christopher Saheed. Chris's critical role in supporting and advising Friends of CRLS

from our inception in late 2006, makes this an especially meaningful addition to our projects. Like Dr. Saheed, we take seriously the school motto, "Opportunity, Diversity, Respect". This is the underpinning of not only this scholarship fund, but indeed our approach to all of the FOCRLS-sponsored projects. As of this writing, **the Saheed Scholarship Fund has increased to \$7000.**

I hope you will read on for details about how FOCRLS has raised funds for these opportunities. Please consider joining our efforts. Our dreams for the future are big, and we can only realize them with the support of people like you. Every dollar given, raffle ticket sold, gift certificate offered by a local business, chat with a potential sponsor, phone call to alumni, helps to widen the community of support for Cambridge Rindge and Latin School. Ours is one of the most unique, diverse, and successful urban high schools in the country. **Our mission is to make sure that all CRLS students experience that success**.

Dr. Christopher Saheed: An Appreciation



When Friends of CRLS began to take shape in late 2006 as an idea for a way that our community could support academic programs at CRLS, parent co-founders Donna Spiegelman and Elaine Schear sought out the counsel and support of Principal Dr. Christopher Saheed. Although this would be the first of many productive meetings with Dr. Saheed over the next five years, this was the most critical. Dr. Saheed listened to two parents he'd never before met and gave the green light to a new venture in building a community of support for the high school, a venture that has since captured the imagination of Cambridge families, businesses, faculty and staff, alumni of CRLS and its predecessor schools, and many others who are committed to assuring success for Cambridge public school youth. As of the completion of this report, Friends of CRLS, which started with no "seed money" and operates as a 100% volunteer 501c3 nonprofit organization, has raised close to \$180,000 and has launched a half a dozen programs that play an important role of the life of the school. Dr. Saheed's cooperation, support, and encouragement has been a significant factor. In September 2010, the FOCRLS Board voted to have the CRLS principal serve as an ex officio member of the FOCRLS Board, with Dr. Saheed was the first CRLS principal to serve in that role.

As of June, 2011 Dr. Saheed retired. Youthful and energetic, it is hard to believe that "Chris" Saheed has served in faculty and administrative capacities at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School for over thirty years! He leaves behind a model of ethical leadership in which the school motto of "opportunity, diversity, respect" is practiced in day-to-day decision-making and communication. His open-door, thoughtful, collaborative nature has left its mark on Friends of CRLS's mission, programs, and relationships within and outside of our high school. Dr. Saheed's deep respect for and understanding of our extraordinary and historic Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, while striving to improve it, has left an indelible stamp of achievement in high school education and school leadership in Cambridge and far beyond.

Thank you, Chris, from all of us at FOCRLS.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

During 2010-2011, our fourth fiscal year, Friends of Cambridge Rindge and Latin School (FOCRLS) raised \$36,882, primarily in donations from CRLS families, community members, and Cambridge businesses. As of the end of the fiscal year, FOCRLS had raised a total of just under \$170,000 in support of CRLS.

Highlights of this past year were:

- FOCRLS was able for the first time to offer two cycles of Faculty Grants (spring and fall), awarding 16 grants of approximately \$1,000 each to teachers and other staff for innovative proposals for in-classroom and extracurricular enrichment.
- 7 students were selected as FOCRLS Travel Fellows, allowing them to participate in educational and service trips to the Dominican Republic, England, and Spain.
- The Unsung Heroes Program, funded by FOCRLS and administered by the CRLS Deans of Students, awarded to 16 emerging student achievers each semester for their efforts in citizenship, stewardship, gains in attendance, athletic leadership, and academic improvement, eighty students in all to date.
- The Fifth Annual Faculty Distinction Awards were presented at graduation to 4 teachers nominated by seniors for their impact on the students' growth and development while at CRLS.
- FOCRLS presented college scholarships ("First Scholars" awards) of \$1000 each to two first-generation, academically talented CRLS students for the first time.
- FOCRLS Fiscal Sponsorship program facilitated fundraising for the CRLS London Trip (2011), as well as for Celebrate CRLS and the CRLS Arts Committee.

Our fundraising was undertaken through mailed and emailed appeals, personal outreach, a parent-hosted house party, a raffle, an alumni brunch, and outreach at CRLS-sponsored events. All work for FOCRLS is carried out by a committed and growing group of volunteers. There is no paid staff nor office rental. Costs are kept to a minimum specifically to optimize our ability to directly support students and faculty through FOCRLS' programs within the high school.

MISSION AND GOVERNANCE

FOCRLS was created in December 2006, with the mission to raise private funds from within the Cambridge community to support and enrich the academic and social development programs at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School and in so doing promote achievement for all students and a greater community investment in the future of Cambridge youth.

The close of this year saw the retirement of CRLS Principal Dr. Christopher Saheed. Principal Saheed has worked tirelessly for the well-being of the students of CRLS. As an *ex officio* member of the FOCRLS Board, he has been an indispensible advocate for FOCRLS among his administrative team, staff, parents, and students. The FOCRLS Board celebrated his achievements during a June dinner at the Inn at Harvard honoring him, while welcoming incoming Interim Principal Damon Smith, who will join the FOCRLS Board in the coming fiscal year. Bob Steininger, who has served on the FOCRLS Board since September 2010 also stepped down as of the FOCRLS Annual Meeting in June. He remains active in supporting CRLS through his significant role in the Celebrate CRLS effort.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS 2010-11

Elaine Schear (President), Ed.D.co-founder of FOCRLS, is a life-long supporter and product of public education. In addition to teaching and social work, she has been a member of the faculty in teacher education programs at Wheelock and Emmanuel Colleges and has served as director of the Teaching-Learning Center at Roxbury Community College. She is a tutor of writing skills at the CRLS Tutoring Center and in private practice. She serves on the Advisory Committee of the Celebrate CRLS project. She is the mother of a 2010 CRLS graduate and a current CRLS student, Class of '14.

Jamie Sabino (Treasurer) is the parent of two children, one a student at CRLS, class of 2014. Jamie served as president of the Friends of the King Open School and chaired the King Open Events and Fundraising Committee. As an attorney in private practice, her work encompasses, among other things, the court system's response to victims of domestic violence. She also serves on the Celebrate CRLS Gala Committee.

Elizabeth Vernon (Secretary) is Lee M. Friedman Judaica Technical Services Librarian in the Harvard College Library, Harvard University. She has a doctorate in Library Administration and has over a decade of experience as a data management and database design consultant, including extensive pro bono work with nonprofit organizations.

Neil Rosenburg (Board), a graduate of Cambridge High and Latin School, is the parent of a student at at CRLS, class of 2012. Since 2008, Neil has involved himself in the work of FOCRLS, with particular emphasis on publicity, event planning, and fundraising. Neil has extensive experience on the boards of several nonprofit organizations. He is Director of Finance at UMass/Boston.

Christopher Saheed, (Board, *Ex Officio*) Principal of CRLS, has acted as a chief advisor to Friends of CRLS since its inception in December 2006 until his retirement in June 2011. Chris's watchwords of "opportunity, diversity, respect" have helped shape the lives of many CRLS students. His vision and energy at CRLS throughout the past 37 years as a teacher, administrator, and most recently Principal, will be sorely missed by the CRLS community.

Donna Spiegelman (Board), co-founder of FOCRLS, is Professor of Epidemiologic Methods at the Harvard School of Public Health, in the Departments of Epidemiology and Biostatistics. She is a member of the national advisory board of J Street, an organization that works to promote a peaceful end to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and is chair of its local chapter. She has served FOCRLS as its first president and later as treasurer. She also serves on the Steering Committee, Finance Committee and the Gala Committee of the Celebrate CRLS project. She is mother of a CRLS student, class of '14 and another who graduated from CRLS in 2010.

Bob Steininger (Board) is Senior Vice President for Manfacturing at Acceleron, Inc., a Cambridge Biotechnology firm. He previously spent over 24 years at Genetics Institute and Millennium Pharmaceuticals. His three older children graduated from CRLS, the most recent in 2009; another entered in 2011. He started a biotech program offered at the Fitzgerald School and has served as an advisor to the RSTA (Rindge School of Technical Arts, within CRLS) biotechnology program. He coordinates the CCRLS Technology Committee and serves on the Celebrate CRLS Advisory Committee.

FOCRLS PROGRAMS

Faculty Grants

In FY2011, because of its successful fundraising, FOCRLS was for the first time able to sponsor TWO faculty grant cycles in one academic year—Fall 2010 and Spring 2011, giving staff twice the opportunity to apply, and expanding the number of grants. Grant proposals are sought from across the spectrum of the school's academic and social development courses, programs, and extracurricular clubs. The Faculty Grants

are meant to make possible innovation that enhances and enriches the curriculum. Our aim is to reach many diverse programs and students of many different capacities, talents, and interests.

Proposals were solicited from CRLS faculty through school-wide email, fliers, the CRLS website, the daily DYK (Did You Know), and through paper copies to every member of the teaching, social worker, counselor, and library, and club advisory staff. Applications were blind-reviewed in November and March by a review committees composed of CRLS parents, community members, and alumni.

Eight grants of up to \$1000 were awarded in November 2010 and eight in March 2011 to the faculty listed below to be used on their projects during the calendar year following the grant. In total \$13,951 in grants was spent this year to fund 16 projects (up from 11 projects in FY2011) among 21 faculty

members (including several two or three-person collaborations) with grant recipients reflective of the range of educational resources available to students at CRLS. (To date, 68 faculty and staff have received grants.)

Faculty are required to submit evaluation materials developed by FOCRLS. Evaluation materials written by students are particularly encouraged, and grantees have complied with thoughtful responses that help us to assess our current and future Faculty Grant funding goals.

Unsung Heroes

The Unsung Heroes program, in its fourth year, recognizes emerging student achievers whose progress and efforts often go unseen and "under the radar." Criteria for recognition include but are not limited to the purely academic. Citizenship, stewardship, gains in attendance, athletic leadership, and academic improvement are all considered during the nomination process carried out by deans of students, counselors, and teachers. Students may be recognized for going beyond their "personal best" as students, for helping a classmate in distress, for service they perform within or outside of CRLS. Winners are selected each semester through the vigilance of deans and faculty. Unsung Heroes are chosen from each grade and Learning Community, for a total of 16 Unsung Heroes each semester – some 80 students recognized to date.

In what has become a tradition, awardees are presented with certificates and customized watches with the CRLS Falcon logo at the main campus during a breakfast program attended by their family members, deans of students, counselors, and FOCRLS representatives, and at the 9th grade campus at assemblies attended by their peers.

Student Travel Fellowships

High school-sponsored trips give students the first-hand opportunity to experience cultures, lives, languages, and locations unlike their own. The students' ability to think globally about issues - whether cultural, aesthetic, ecological, or economic - broadens them as people who are likely to have a positive impact both here and abroad. However, trips are often costly and for many of our students, difficult to afford. With this in mind, FOCRLS sponsors a Travel Fellows Program, available to students with a B average or higher, whose financial resources would otherwise prohibit such school-sponsored trips. Prospective fellows must apply, meet financial criteria, and submit letters of recommendation, after which a review committee makes selections; grants in 2010-11 were available for a maximum of \$2500, with supplemental funds raised by the student.

This year, seven students were selected as Travel Fellows, three for a service trip to the Dominican Republic (offered through Spanish language instructor Juan Casillas) two for the "Curtain Time in London" trip to London (offered through literature/language instructor Ariela Maloney and theater instructor Monica Murray) and two for a summer exchange trip to Spain for students of Spanish (offered through a collaboration between Spanish instructors Sherry Madden and Jennifer McConnell).

For the fifth consecutive year, FOCRLS funded the Faculty Distinction Awards. Recipients of these Awards were nominated by the outgoing CRLS seniors, who identify the instructors who have most made a difference in their learning and and growth while at CRLS. The biography of each faculty member is read by the Principal, and engraved plaques are presented by senior class officers, to the cheers of the graduates. 2011 Faculty Distinction awardees were Alice Chen (librarian), Lance Dottin (athletics), Isabel Frankel (math), and Ariel Maloney (language and literature).

First Scholars

In 2011, FOCRLS initiated a very significant new program – the First Scholars Awards. These scholarships of \$1000 each go to academically talented seniors who are the first in their family to attend a four-year institution of higher education.

Our "first" of the First Scholars awards went to Class of 2011 Seniors Michael McKeown, who will enter Boston University, and Lutane Clenord, who will enter UMass/Boston. Michael and Lutane have both been active in the community within and outside of CRLS and both will pursue careers in health and medicine.

Fiscal Sponsorship

FOCRLS status and mission as a CRLS-related 501(c)3 non-profit enables us to provide the opportunity to groups within CRLS community, to receive donations which will be tax-deductible to the donor. Student clubs (with application by a teacher advisor) and alumni groups are eligible, among others, to apply for fiscal sponsorship.

During FY2011, \$7857 was raised for activities at and relating to CRLS via FOCRLS fiscal sponsorships. The majority of that was raised by the London trip, with the remainder raised by Celebrate CRLS and the CRLS Arts Committee.

DONATIONS AND GIFTS

Summary of Giving

\$37,885 was raised this year in donations from all sources, including individual donations, grants, corporate donations, and raffle sales, but excluding fiscal sponsorship donations. (See below for information on fiscal sponsorships.) This represents a 32% increase in donations over the previous year.

In addition, FOCRLS received well over \$3,000 in in-kind donations of goods and services during the course of the year.

FUNDRAISING PROJECTS AND EVENTS

Solicitation Letters

The major source of donations to FOCRLS was the mailed solicitation: in December 2010 (end-of-year/holiday) and in May 2011 (pre-graduation). The December mailing went to the CRLS/CPS community (parents of students in grades 8-12), a subset of Cambridge homeowners, and a subset of alumni. The May mailing went to parents of students in grades 9-12, to a subset of Cambridge homeowners, and a subset of alumni in reunioning classes. An email solicitation was sent to a subset of CRLS families and alumni as well. These seasonal solicitations brought in a total of \$22,831 (with \$19,976 in 124 gifts coming in as a result of the December solicitations, and \$2855 in 39 gifts from the May solicitation.)

FOCRLS Raffle at the Harvard Square MayFair

FOCRLS culminated its Fourth Annual MayFair Raffle on Sunday May 1, 2011, thanks to the generosity of the Harvard Square Business Association, who provided a table at the Harvard Square MayFair free of charge, in a central and lively location. This event has been critical in building FOCRLS partnerships and goodwill with the Cambridge business community and visibilitywith the general public, raising awareness about our work.

This event reflects strong support in the business community for FOCRLS, with some 46 local businesses donating 66 raffle prizes, for a total value of approximately \$3000. (See the Business Donors section for a listing of prize donors.)

Tickets were sold for \$5 apiece, 5 for \$20 throughout the month preceding the Harvard Square MayFair event. Ticket sales totaled \$4180 (up from \$2588 the previous year). Tickets were sold to 191 people, through a variety of methods of outreach: email solicitations, with tickets purchased via Google Checkout on the FOCRLS website, inperson sales by volunteers to friends and family, tables at CRLS theater events, and a table in front of the Cambridge Central Post office.

House Party

On December 5, Cambridge Rindge and Latin parents Donna and Ray Erikson (with support from CRLS parents Robin Bonner, Lois Brunet, Janet Randall, Lynn Cadwallader, Ellen Ezorsky, Lindsay Frazier, Susan Manning, Trish Marti, Patty Nolan, Jonathan King, David Vogel, Neil Rosenburg, and Jamie Sabino) hosted a gathering on behalf of FOCRLS. Food for the event was very generously provided by the Middle East Restaurant, Petsi Pies, S and S, the Wine and Cheese Cask, and Zing Pizza.

The 67 attendees (parents, faculty, alumni, and members of the community) heard Principal Dr. Christopher Saheed, Dean of Students Jamalh Prince, several FOCRLS Faculty Innovation Grant recipients (Alice Chen, Holly Samuels, and Debbi Milligan), and two student recipients of the FOCRLS-funded Unsung Heroes awards speak eloquently about the ways that CRLS has made a difference in the lives of students at CRLS.

In addition, guests were treated to a slide show of faculty grant recipients produced by photography instructor Debbi Milligan. The house party generated connections between parents, strengthened support for Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, and raised \$3,551 in new contributions to the school.

LOOKING AHEAD: ALL EYES ON CRLS AND "FOCRLS AT FIVE"

2011/2012 will be a milestone year at CRLS. Renovations will be completed on the main campus. The two main buildings will be outfitted with the latest green technologies. Classrooms and office spaces will be spacious and airy. FOCRLS has its own brand-new office at CRLS – Room 2136 in the main building. The award-winning new public library and recent renovations at the War Memorial athletics building next door, along with our leafy public park surrounding the school on Broadway, make for a campus that offers something of value for all members of the Cambridge community.

At a time when most communities are making painful cuts to school budgets, Cambridge's city planners have combined foresight with the funds to carry forward a promise of improvement and completion at CRLS. Over the past two years, students and faculty have readjusted to daily life in a construction zone. During this period, freshman students have been housed in a separate facility (the former Longfellow School). In 2011, however, students, faculty, administration and staff will be reunited. Many events are planned to bring the community together to mark the occasion of our improved, historic high school through a community group and series of events known as "Celebrate CRLS", including a ribbon cutting, campus tours, informational sessions, a gala and more.

In addition to playing a critical role in the formulation and planning of these events to mark the CRLS re-opening, Friends of CRLS will celebrate a marker event of its own: our fifth year as the one 501c3 non-profit organization in Cambridge that is solely devoted to academic excellence and opportunity at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School. Donation by donation, from 5 dollars to thousands of dollars in individual and business donations, we have met our goal of supporting faculty members and students who have sought funding for enhancements in curriculum, recognition for achievement while in school, and scholarships for school-sponsored travel and for higher education. Despite a serious national and global economic downturn, Cambridge residents, businesses, and alumni are stalwart in their commitment to our youth.
