Friends of Cambridge Rindge and Latin School (FOCRLS) celebrated our 8<sup>th</sup> anniversary – and **passing \$400,000 in total donations so far!** – at our School Year Kick-off on September 23 with a cake and the welcoming of parents, city leaders, volunteers, and donors. At the gathering, co-hosted by **FOCRLS President Elaine Schear (pictured at left) and FOCRLS Treasurer Jamie Sabino (pictured below)**, longtime FOCRLS volunteers spoke to parents new to CRLS about the benefits of involvement and the



extent of our impact, with thousands of students reached through FOCRLS programs. Craig Kelley, who is active with FOCRLS in addition to being a Cambridge City Council member, described FOCRLS as “one of the jewels in the CRLS crown.” Larry Aaronson, a former CRLS history teacher, spoke about FOCRLS as the one organization that has succeeded, where others have failed, in harnessing the support of the CRLS and Cambridge communities over the course of the school's long history. Elisa Pepe, webmaster for FOCRLS.org, added, “FOCRLS fills important gaps in student and teacher support that the district does not have time or money to. FOCRLS listened to my time and interest parameters and found a volunteer activity that fits perfectly. I have been especially impressed at how organized and dynamic FOCRLS is.”

### Innovation Nation: Faculty Innovation Grants Proposals Now Being Accepted!

We released our request for proposals for the 2014/15 cycle of Faculty Innovation Grants on September 24 and will continue actively promoting the grants until **proposals are due on November 3**. Since 2007, FOCRLS has awarded over 90 Faculty Innovation Grants, and this cycle will include number 100! Grants, each up to \$1,000, have been awarded across the range of CRLS departments and clubs for creative learning and social development projects and experiences that are not fundable through the Cambridge Public Schools/CRLS budget. Projects funded through FOCRLS often have lasting results and long-term impacts upon students' learning. ## Teacher Feature: Congratulations to the Faculty Distinction Awardees!

Four beloved and admired teachers at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School (CRLS) were honored with Faculty Distinction Awards at the June 5, 2014 graduation ceremony. Sponsored by Friends of Cambridge Rindge and Latin School (FOCRLS) and organized by Assistant Principal Bobby Tynes, Faculty Distinction Awards are presented each year to the four teachers or staff members chosen by the graduating class as those who had the most positive influence. After Principal Damon Smith read honorees' self-submitted bios to the graduates and guests, the honorees were presented with framed certificates and letters of appreciation.

Jon Baring-Gould, Amanda Hughes, Ned Flaherty, and Susie Van Blaricum were selected for their abilities to teach, inspire, and encourage students.

Jon Baring-Gould, now in his 20th year as a ceramics instructor at CRLS, joined the faculty of his high school alma mater after receiving a Master of Art Education from MassArt. He credits his CRLS teachers for a lesson he instills in his students: believe you can succeed and flourish.

Amanda Hughes holds a Master of Education from Lesley and is working on a Master of American Literature from Harvard. Since 2009, she has taught American literature at CRLS and encourages students to use literature to develop empathy, challenge their thinking, and maintain joy.

Ned Flaherty, who has taught history at CRLS since 1997, holds a Master of Teaching from Northeastern. Outside of school he is a builder and he loves both of his jobs.

Susie Van Blaricum holds two Masters' Degrees from the Harvard Graduate School of Education. She has taught history and psychology in her eight years at CRLS, where she is also a dedicated advisor of the Club 4 students who volunteer twice weekly at the Harvard Square Homeless Shelter. As of September 2014, she is the Dean of Students of CRLS's Learning Community "L."

This year's honorees brought the total to 32 faculty recognized since FOCRLS began the tradition in 2007.
