Executive Summary

Accomplishments of Friends of CRLS during Fiscal Year 2018-19 (July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019)

We raised \$145,811 in funds to support opportunities for CRLS students, graduates, and faculty.

- → \$137,912 in monetary donations, bringing our monetary donation grand total (FY06/07-FY18/19) to \$1,235,420
- → \$4,872 in Spring Raffle ticket sales plus \$250 in Spring Bash raffle ticket sales
- → \$2,777 in investment income

Additionally, we received approximately \$27,000 worth of in-kind donations. This total estimate includes the contributions from Google of the venue and catering for our Spring Bash in Kendall Square, as well as items and prizes from various donors for the live auction, online auction, and raffle in conjunction with the Spring Bash and our separate our Spring Raffle

- The Friends of CRLS Spring 2019 Bash raised \$75,500. Google in Kendall Square hosted and catered the event on February 28, 2019, which featured CNN/BPR/WGBH contributor Juliette Kayyem as our emcee and State Rep. Marjorie Decker as our guest speaker. The event was made possible by 28 event sponsors, a multitude of volunteers, and numerous donors.
- College Scholarships presented by FOCRLS totaled \$53,000. We presented \$51,500 in scholarships to 36 members of the CRLS Class of 2019 and remitted three \$500 installments for multi-year scholarships to our '18, '17, and '16 recipients.
- Faculty Innovation Grants totalled \$11,500. We awarded grants to 14 teachers and staff members to fund 12 individual and collaborative proposals of up to \$1,000 each to enrich curriculum in subjects including biology, music, drama, dance, poetry, health & wellness, and English.
- Student Travel Fellowships totalled \$22,100. We awarded fellowships to 14 financially and academically qualified students for educational trips: five students to Switzerland, France, Spain, Italy & Monaco; four students to Japan; one student to Italy & Greece; and four members of the UNICEF Club to Washington, D.C. for the 2019 UNICEF USA Annual Student Summit.
- Unsung Heroes Awards, funded by FOCRLS and organized by the CRLS Deans of Students, were presented each term to 16 students who have emerging leadership qualities yet don't see out the spotlight.
- Faculty Distinction Awards were presented, for the thirteenth year, on the graduation stage in June to four faculty members nominated by seniors for their positive influence.

Programs

College Scholarships

Friends of CRLS presented a total of \$53,000 in College Scholarships during FY18-19, including \$51,500 to 36 members of the CRLS Class of 2019, which was \$2,000 more than we presented to the Class of 2018. We also remitted three \$500 installments for the "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarships to our '18, '17, and '16 recipients.

This year FOCRLS premiered the Elaine Schear "Voice of the First Generation" Creative Writing Scholarship, established to honor our organization's co-founder and original Executive Director (who retired on August 31, 2018), to a graduating senior who demonstrates a talent for and an interest in creative writing and who is a first generation college student.

Gassendina is now attending UMass Amherst, studying international relations:

We also had the honor of presenting the CRLS Core Values Scholarship Sponsored by the Class of 1953, who collected the funds to commemorate the 65th anniversary of their high school graduation.

"The intersection of the brain and exercise is my passion. I want to become a scientific researcher and unravel the impacts of exercise on treating neurodegenerative disorders. Since the age of two, I have been volunteering for the organization Birthday Wishes, and throughout my educational and professional careers, I will continue committing my time to others' wellbeing."



Student Travel Fellowships

Friends of CRLS awarded \$22,100 in Student Travel Fellowships during FY18-19, divided among 14 students:

- four members of the UNICEF Club to Washington, D.C. for the 2019 UNICEF USA Annual Student Summit in March
- five on the April trip to Switzerland, France, Spain, Italy & Monaco
- four on the June trip to Japan
- one on the July trip to Italy & Greece

Fellowships covered up to 75% of trip costs, with each of the fellows raising and earning 25% or more of the money they needed to participate in their educational, school-authorized, group trips of choice. All travel fellows, who met academic and financial requirements, were recommended by CRLS faculty.

Since 2009, FOCRLS has sponsored the Unsung Heroes program, which celebrates 16 students each term, one per grade per learning community. Students are chosen by deans, counselors, and teachers for their particular emerging leadership qualities, such as support of peers, community service, academic improvement, contributing to a positive school environment, and other achievements that might otherwise go unrecognized. The Heroes and their families attend breakfast celebrations — catered by the Rindge School of Technical Arts culinary department — where certificates and Falcon logo watches are presented to the honorees.

Summary of Giving

In FY2018-19, FOCRLS received **\$137,912.00** in monetary donations from hundreds of generous people in and around Cambridge who want to brighten the future for our students and our whole community: **\$83,264.40** from individual donors, including families, and **\$54,647.60** from organizations, including businesses, corporations, and foundations. 

The evening's live entertainment was provided by the harmonious singing of CRLS student a cappella groups (whose adviser is Dr. Ivan Stefanov) and the cool contemporary music of The Jazz Cats Quartet (three of whom are CRLS alumni).

State Representative and CRLS alumna Marjorie Decker returned as our featured speaker. For the third year, Rep. Decker offered to guide State House tours for donors of \$250 to FOCRLS and attracted 10 donors and their guests to Beacon Hill.

The Bash culminated with the live auction of five highly desirable offerings, including a gourmet dinner for four prepared in the winning bidder's home by CRLS alum Chef Carl Dooley and a weeklong stay in a luxurious Miami Beach condo. The combination of generous donors and enthusiastic bidders resulted in \$8,100 for FOCRLS programs. We also held an online auction, which ran in the weeks leading up to the Bash and one day after, bringing in \$4,185.

Event sponsorships (a total of \$36,500), ticket sales, donations, the live auction, the online auction, and a one-night on-site raffle all contributed to the **\$75,500 grand total**. All funds raised support College Scholarships, Student Travel Fellowships, Faculty Innovation Grants, Faculty Distinction Awards, and Unsung Heroes.

Spring Raffle 2019

This year we raffled off a record number of prizes with 63! The estimated total prize value was \$2,885 – including seven prizes @ \$100 or more – thanks to generous local businesses, several of whom donated more than one gift card/certificate.

We sold Spring Raffle tickets online, along with one in-person sales site, our Harvard Square MayFair table, courtesy of the Harvard Square Business Association. The raffle ticket sales total of \$4,872 (which exceeded last year's sales by \$445), included \$4,265 in tickets online through the focrIs.org link featured in our blasts to our ~5,600 email contacts from April 8 to May 23. The MayFair was held on its rain date of May 18, and although that day was also inclement, our dedicated volunteers managed to raise \$607.

We drew the winners at the beginning of June using an online randomizer and mailed the prizes to their lucky recipients.
