# Remembering Dr. Christopher Saheed



Friends of Cambridge Rindge & Latin School (FOCRLS) would like to share with the community an appreciation of Dr. Christopher Saheed, who was a key collaborator in forming our organization. As the high school's principal at the time, he provided invaluable advice and encouragement to Elaine Schear and Donna Spiegelman, the two CRLS parents who founded our non-profit in 2006 to support opportunities for students, graduates, and faculty. "Although we were brand new CRLS parents when we approached Dr. Saheed about starting a non-profit, he didn't flinch. He even made sure FOCRLS had an office at the school," said Dr. Schear. "We soon were offering grants to faculty for innovative projects – his idea for how to support a range of students and faculty and become visible at the school. This was Chris: purposeful, down-to-earth, supportive." Since 2007, FOCRLS has awarded Faculty Innovation Grants, each up to \$1,000, to 235 teachers, club advisers, counselors, social workers, librarians, and administrators for projects expanding the curriculum beyond the normal budget.

Dr. Saheed, who held degrees from Tufts, Suffolk, and Harvard universities, retired from CRLS in 2011 and then moved to Florida. He succumbed to pancreatic cancer on June 25, 2020, after a three-year battle.

When FOCRLS reached out to James Maloney, Chief Operating Officer of the District (Cambridge Public Schools), for a memory about Dr. Saheed, he responded, "I had the good fortune of working closely with Chris during his years as the principal of CRLS on the renovation of the high school. I was struck by his calm, knowledgeable and caring demeanor. All of the buildings on the campus today reflect his vision for the school. In many ways the high school campus is a living memorial to his passion for the students of Cambridge. He was a tremendous leader."

In honor of his retirement and through the generosity of an anonymous benefactor, FOCRLS established a scholarship named after Dr. Saheed. Since 2012, FOCRLS has awarded fourteen of these \$1,000 scholarships to ease college costs for academically and financially qualified CRLS seniors planning to pursue careers in the field of education. FOCRLS has expanded our scholarship offerings each year, with college scholarships totaling \$55,500 awarded to 36 members of the CRLS Class of 2020 with a range of aspirations and backgrounds.

Around the time of his diagnosis, Dr. Saheed contributed \$5,000 to the fund, becoming the sponsor of the annual scholarship from 2018 through 2022. Several of Dr. Saheed's friends recently (FY2020-21) donated in his memory, some providing moving tributes.

Ed Hashek and John Jors said, "Christopher and his husband Stephen have been our best friends for a number of years. He will be truly missed – such a generous, intelligent, and caring person."

Dr. Saheed shared 43 of his 67 years with Stephen Z. Nonack, who also studied at Tufts University – where the two met in 1973 before making their relationship permanent in 1977 – as well as Simmons University and UMass Boston, and built his career at the Boston Athenæum as an archivist and librarian.

"Dr. Saheed was a gentle, inspiring educator, and an exceptional human being," said friend Patrick Ladden, an educator and museum director. "It took many months before he disclosed his own background and education achievements, as he mostly was enthusiastic to talk about CRLS, not himself."

Dr. Saheed's enthusiasm, generosity of spirit, and caring personality will be missed by numerous people, and even those who never had the pleasure of meeting him will continue to feel his influence.

# Executive Summary

## Accomplishments of Friends of CRLS during Fiscal Year 2019-20 (July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020)

**We raised \$162,556 in funds to support opportunities for CRLS students, graduates, and faculty.**

- **\$160,212** in donations, bringing our monetary donation grand total (FY06/07-FY19/20) to \$1,395,632
- **\$2,344** in investment income

**The Friends of CRLS 2020 Spring Bash raised \$32,744.52.** Although we had to cancel the live event due to the pandemic, 19 sponsors honored the pledges they made before March. Also, the team at Google, who had been planning to host and cater the Bash, graciously changed their in-kind donation to a monetary one, donating \$10,000 to our organization.

**College Scholarships presented by FOCRLS totaled \$57,000.** We presented \$55,500 in scholarships to 36 members of the CRLS Class of 2020 and remitted three \$500 installments for multi-year scholarships to our '19, '18, and '17 recipients.

**Faculty Innovation Grants totalled \$12,791.** We awarded grants to 30 teachers and staff members to fund 15 individual and collaborative proposals of up to \$1,000 each to enrich curriculum in areas including physics, calculus, web design, robotics, creative writing, understanding substance abuse, and community building.

**Student Travel Fellowships totalled \$8,126.** We distributed \$6,826 among four students joining in on the February school vacation trip to Portugal & Spain and issued \$1,300 to the World Jazz Ensemble to complete the band performing at the Panama Jazz Festival.

**Unsung Heroes Awards**, funded by FOCRLS and organized by the CRLS Deans of Students, were presented each in-school term to 16 students who have emerging leadership qualities noticed by teachers and other staff.

**Faculty Distinction Awards** were given, for the 14th year, in coordination with commencement in June to four faculty members nominated by graduating seniors for their positive influence.

# Programs

## College Scholarships

**Friends of CRLS presented a total of \$57,000 in College Scholarships during FY19-20.**

We distributed \$55,500 to 36 members of the CRLS Class of 2020. This was \$4,000 more than we presented to the Class of 2019, with ten scholarships -- five "100 by 100" Cambridge Business Community STEAM Scholarships, four Colonel & Mrs. Henry Bayard McCoy Memorial Scholarship, one "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarship -- each increased in award amount plus a fifth Charlene Holmes Memorial Award added.

We also remitted three \$500 installments for the "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarships to our '19, '18, and '17 recipients.

### **"100 by 100" Cambridge Business Community STEAM Scholarships for Technology and Engineering, Sponsored by Philips North America, LLC**

Philips North America, LLC, innovator of an array of personal care, health, and home products, recently moved its North American headquarters to Cambridge Crossing, and to support the students in its new community, a corporate responsibility specialist reached out to us about sponsoring college scholarships. Philips generously took on two of our five "100 by 100" Cambridge Business Community STEAM Scholarships, focusing on technology and engineering. Their gift enabled us to increase all five of our normally \$2,000 "100 by 100" awards to \$2,500 each.

CRLS Class of 2020 members Nazari Tuyo and Muhammed Abdalla received the scholarships for their commitments to the fields of technology and engineering, respectively. Both of these fervidly curious students have been immersed in their areas of study since childhood and developed impressive ranges of marketable skills while at CRLS.



## Student Travel Fellowships

**Friends of CRLS awarded \$8,126 in Student Travel Fellowships during FY19-20** to students participating in educational group trips led by CRLS teachers. We distributed \$6,826 among four students joining in on the February school vacation trip to Portugal & Spain and issued \$1,300 to the World Jazz Ensemble to complete the band performing at the Panama Jazz Festival in Central America.

Fellowships covered up to 75% of trip costs, with each of the fellows raising and earning 25% or more of the money they needed to go on the trips. All travel fellows, who met academic and financial requirements, were highly recommended by CRLS faculty.



## Unsung Heroes

Since 2009, FOCRLS has sponsored the Unsung Heroes program, which celebrates 16 students each in-school term, one per grade per learning community. Students are nominated by deans, counselors, and teachers as emerging learners who play a positive role in the CRLS community.

## Faculty Distinction Awards



**Janira Arocho** has been a biology teacher for 26 years: 16 in Boston and 10 at CRLS, where she currently teaches AP Biology and Sheltered English Instruction Biology. She holds a bachelor's degree in biological sciences and Spanish literature from Wellesley College and a master's degree in education from Harvard University. She strives to create an atmosphere where students are challenged and receive support. She finds inspiration in her students, especially those who show incredible resilience in the face of seemingly insurmountable obstacles.



**Dionne Campbell**, a Cambridge native, holds a B.A. in history from Ripon College in Wisconsin and an M.A. in teaching from Tufts University. 
