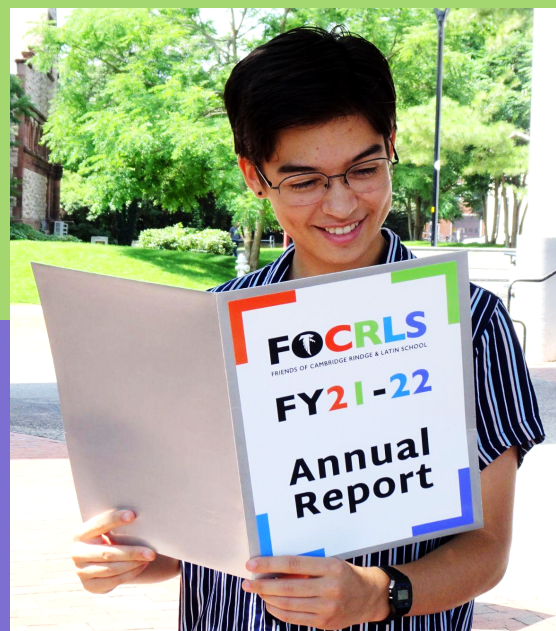

Executive Summary

FOCRLS's accomplishments during Fiscal Year 2021-22 (July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022)

We raised \$216,271 in funds to support opportunities for CRLS students, graduates, and faculty:

- \$215,221 in donations, bringing our monetary donation grand total (FY06-07 through FY21-22) to \$1,782,500
- \$ 1,050 in investment income

College Scholarships — We awarded scholarships totalling \$81,750 to deserving, determined students with educational goals beyond high school and career aspirations.

Faculty Innovation Grants — We awarded \$9,733 in the form of 10 grants to teachers, advisors, administrators, and other staff members who submitted creative ideas for enhancing curriculum and clubs.

Unsung Heroes Awards — We sponsored recognitions to 32 high schoolers who have emerging leadership qualities identified by faculty and staff.

Faculty Distinction Awards — We produced framed certificates, which Principal Smith presented at commencement to four teachers nominated for their positive influence by the graduating class.

Fiscal Sponsorships — We disbursed \$15,406 to Falcon's Market for the purchase of Market Basket gift cards for CRLS families experiencing food insecurity. We assisted in establishing the Ginny Berkowitz Award for Media Arts & Social Justice, processed \$5,000 for the John & Ellen Moot Community Service Awards, and more.



"My academic interests, computer science and social justice, may appear disconnected. Programs

College Scholarships

Friends of CRLS presented a total of \$81,750 in College Scholarships during FY 2021-2022. This sum is an increase of \$10,000 (14%) over last year's total.

We presented 54 scholarships totaling \$77,750 at CRLS Scholarship Night on Thursday, May 5. With one exception, all new awardees are members of the Class of 2022.

Three families established scholarships this past year, adding four new scholarships to our annual roster:

- Cheri Kamen Memorial Scholarship in the Humanities
- N Rahman Scholarship
- Scholarships for Equity & Social Justice (2)

Individual award amounts were increased for 12 of our long-standing scholarships:

- Friends of CRLS First Scholars Awards (3)
- Friends of CRLS First Scholars Awards Sponsored by Cambridge Trust Company (1)*
- CRLS Core Values Scholarships (4)
- Dr. David A. Link Scholarships for the Health Professions (2)
- Earl M. Gardner Scholarships (2)

*Cambridge Trust Company increased the amount of their scholarship and then doubled their sponsorship, adding a second scholarship.

In addition to the scholarships we oversee within our program, we presented an AVID Scholarship and a one-time Scholarship to Honor Drs. Finn and Espinosa.

We also issued \$4,000 in funds to three alumni awardees: two installments of "It Takes a Village" Multi-Year Scholarships and a pair of targeted donations as supplemental scholarships to the 2020 awardee of the CambridgeSeven STEAM Scholarship.

Awardees meet academic, extracurricular, financial, and college enrollment requirements and demonstrate scholarship-specific criteria through applications, essays, and transcripts.

All scholarships are for graduating seniors, with the exception of the Calvin Hicks Memorial Award for the Study of Music, which can go to a student in any grade, 9-12.

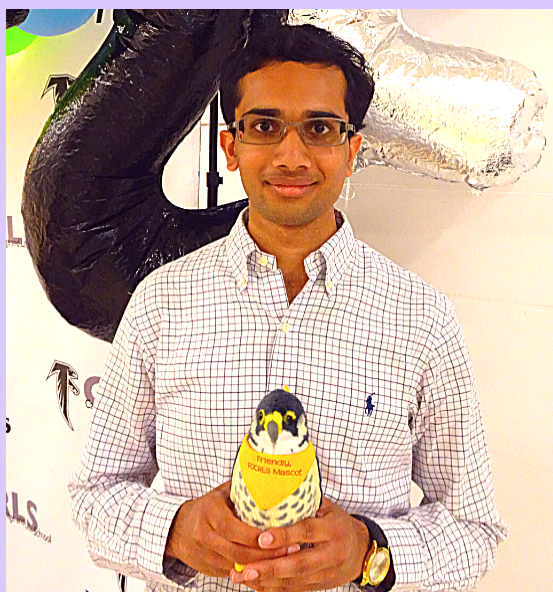

Faculty Innovation Grants

After pausing Faculty Innovation Grants during remote learning, we resumed in the '21-'22 school year. FOCRLS invited faculty members to submit proposals describing their ideas to enhance their classes, clubs, and programs beyond what Cambridge Public Schools could fund. We were happy to receive proposals for a variety of new projects and experiences to develop skills, services, inclusion, advocacy, culture, creativity, community, and collaboration.

We awarded \$9,733 in the form of 10 grants to 15 teachers, club advisors, and other CRLS staff members, several of whom were collaborating with colleagues to add dimension and reach more students:



Lynette R. Belle (pictured left), Best Buddies Club Advisor — **“Bringing Back Best Buddies”** to re-establish the chapter, which will provide leadership, networking, and support opportunities for students with and without disabilities.

Katy Greene and Lily Rayman-Read, OSS Co-teachers, History — **“‘Culture Builds a Nation: How Food and Music Impact History’ Course Hands-on Experience”** to give students studying the continents opportunities to sample flavors from around the world.

Sam Matson, HSEP Math Teacher — **“HSEP Joy Committee”** to create meaningful experiences among students, including those opting to have a hybrid remote / in-person school year, and build better relationships with teachers and other members of the community.

(Additionally, FOCRLS awarded a Student Travel Fellowship to help a MUN club member cover their trip costs.)

Paige Graves, Instructional Technology Specialist — **“Portable Audio Recording Booths”** to bring the experience of high quality podcasting and recording to any educational space in CRLS.

FOCRLS sponsors the Unsung Heroes Awards program, which celebrates students, nominated by teachers and staff members, as emerging leaders who play a positive role in the CRLS community. Honorees, who receive certificates and Falcon logo watches, are selected for excellence or notable improvement in one or more of the following categories: Academics, Athletics, Attendance, Character, Citizenship, Community Service, Contribution to a Positive School Climate, Leadership, Stewardship, and Studentship. Mr. William McDonald, Emie's teacher at CRLS for AP Environmental Science, wrote: “Emie has one of the best work ethics I have ever witnessed in a student. She came to class to work and she worked one hundred percent every day. She would help explain concepts that other students may not understand. She had a deep enough comprehension to help others understand.”

For the 16th consecutive year FOCRLS sponsored the Faculty Distinction Awards. The 2022 recipients bring the total since 2007 to 64 awardees. Members of the Class of 2022 nominated the teachers for having notably positive influences over their high school years, and Principal Damon Smith presented the awards at the graduation ceremony on June 9.

Ms. Jessica Hatlen has been a Special Educator at CRLS for five years and has been an educator for 16 years. She holds a bachelor's degree from Boston University (2002) and a master's degree from Wagner College (2005). One student described Ms. Hatlen as a "really compassionate teacher who makes learning interesting."

Mr. Evan Milstein-Greengart has taught English Language Arts at CRLS for five years and has been a teacher for seven. He has bachelors' degrees in English and Psychology, a master's degree in Secondary Education, and a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Study in Educational Leadership. One student described Mr. M-G as "an angel disguised as an English teacher."

Dr. Benji Cohen graduated from CRLS in 2007 and returned in 2018 to teach History. In the interim, he received degrees from Tufts University (2011) and the University of Virginia (2017). One student described Dr. Cohen as "the most wonderful teacher, with an amazing, sharp sense of humor and a very welcoming classroom."

Mr. Ramazan Nigdelioglu has taught Freshman Physics and AP Physics at CRLS since 2008. He is also the faculty advisor to the Muslim Cultural Club. He holds a bachelor's degree in Physics and a master's degree in School Leadership. A Turkish native, he came to Boston in 2002 as a Fulbright Exchange Teacher. Students describe Mr. N as an educator whose "love of the subject and teaching show" in the way he "makes physics really fun to learn."

Fundraising

Appeal Letters

FOCRLS sent out two appeal letters, one in autumn (holiday) and one in spring (graduation), to the wider CRLS community: parents/guardians of students in grades 9-12, parents/guardians of alumni, alumni, Cambridge homeowners, and other previous contributors. We also emailed the appeals to our 5,000+ contacts through our listserv.

The autumn appeal drew \$36,739 in contributions, and our spring appeal brought in \$9,258, for a total of \$45,997 (an increase of \$2,254 over last year). These contributions are all listed under Donations and Gifts.

Outreach

Our Treasurer & Scholarship Chair has been active in retaining our numerous Scholarship Sponsors as well as building relationships with ongoing and prospective donors. He also manages our fiscal sponsorships, which have increased significantly over the past few years.

By featuring awardees on our website, demonstrating conscientious use of our funds, and developing a presence at CRLS, we have been extremely fortunate to attract families, organizations, and companies seeking ways to support the community.

CRLS faculty members have enlisted our services in being the fiscal sponsor for outside donations they have secured so the givers can report the gifts as tax-deductible.

Remembrance of Dr. David A. Link



David A. Link, M.D., the inspiration for the Dr. David A. Link Scholarship for the Health Professions, passed away on July 7, 2021. Dr. Link, a first-generation American whose parents fled Europe to escape the Holocaust, was a highly accomplished pediatrician deeply devoted to caring for children, families, and the community. His career pinnacle with 30+ years as Chief of Pediatrics at Cambridge Health Alliance and Mt. Auburn Hospital. Upon his retirement from this position in the fall of 2013, colleagues partnered with the Link family and reached out to Friends of CRLS to create the scholarship in his honor.

“The work will always be there, the satisfaction will be enormous, and the task remains challenging,” Dr. Link wrote about the health professions in his personal statement to Friends of CRLS when the scholarship was founded, at which time he provided this photo.

Awardees of this scholarship, first presented in 2014, have expressed their determination not only to provide medical care but to advocate for under-served communities, whether defined by geography, culture, income, age, or extent of health conditions. With one presented each year the first four years and two presented annually since 2018, the scholarship has so far helped 15 students get closer to their goals of becoming physicians, surgeons, nurses, therapists, researchers, and, in one case, a justice-minded medical examiner.

When Dr. Link passed away last summer, Friends of CRLS received an outpouring of donations, many of which were accompanied by touching tributes. “His special character and wisdom will live on through his family and the countless people he helped and taught,” wrote one donor. Others’ notes described Dr. Link as a legendary caregiver, compassionate doctor, passionate advocate, generous soul to many, nurturer to all, dedicated teacher and mentor, curious learner, humanitarian, mensch, and loving husband and father.

In addition to his extensive pediatric work in Cambridge and surrounding cities, Dr. Link was active in his lifelong commitment to the Jewish community, not only in the Boston area, but overseas. As a volunteer with Combined Jewish Philanthropies, he worked in Dnipro (Dnipropetrovsk at the time), Ukraine, to establish health care facilities open to all children of that region.

Dr. Link is survived by his wife of 47 years, Dr. Margaret Ross Link. He is survived also by his three children, Benjamin Link (with wife Dr. Becky Genberg and children Annika and Caleb), Dr. Nathaniel Link (with partner Dr. Yen Pham), and Dr. Rebecca Link (with husband Adam Marvin).
